OUR GUEST SPEAKER



EAN CALDWELL FROM THE DONCASTER CAMERA CLUB

Ean Caldwell's talk on tips for photographing you turned objects was extremely interesting and I am sure we all learned a little bit more about the capabilities of our phone's camera.

He covered the following points:

- Taking the photo
- Lighting
- Focus
- Composition



Ean stressed the point that it was important to bathe your object in light by using reflective surfaces such as white or silver surfaces like cardboard or fabrics.



He also demonstrated a portable light box which can be purchased in store or on line at a very reasonable price. The light box had a built in LED light source which could be operated by remote control to produce different effects and light colours



If you have a horizon line ie. a line where a horizontal plane meets a vertical plane Ean stressed the importance of it being level, otherwise it becomes a distraction and it takes the eye away from the object you are presenting.

Ean suggested that you could do away with the horizon line by using white fabric or paper draped (see right) this will eliminate the horizon line

Perspective: Hold the camera or phone vertically to avoid distortion of your object you are photographing. He also suggested that you use the zoom function to increase or decrease the depth of field.



With a digital camera or phone take a number of pictures from slightly different positions, then you can select the shots you want to keep and delete the others.

You can then crop and edit your final photographs to show your product at its best.

You can experiment with many other techniques such as a black or coloured background and a directional light source. You could stand your object on a high gloss base to get a reflection of the object.
